Subject: Restoring lost and degraded wetlands is urgent! Happy World Wetlands Day.

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Dear Mayor and Council,

With due respect to groundhogs and their top-hatter handlers, today is World Wetlands Day. Happy World Wetlands Day!

The theme for this year's World Wetlands Day is: "It's time for wetlands restoration -- restoring lost and degraded wetlands is urgent!"

It is not only the District's streams and riparian areas that are under constant threat – most are listed as "endangered", a few, "threatened" (Wild, Threatened, Endangered, and Lost streams of the Lower Fraser Valley, Summary Report, 1997 - Habitat and Enhancement Branch, Fisheries and Oceans Canada) – our wetlands are in peril as well. We can't simply write off degraded wetlands, abandoning them to filling and development, they must be restored as they are a crucial ecosystems for biodiversity and humans alike. Wetlands are vital, but we are at a tipping point. Our wetlands, riparian areas and streams, both east and west of Eagle Creek need to be properly protected and restored. This is the time.

Our OCP calls on us to, "Manage our urban environment by strengthening existing environmental regulations and facilitating environmental restoration and enhancement actions; Protect and enhance the ecological integrity of specific natural assets, including our watercourses, riparian areas and watersheds, foreshore areas, and sensitive habitats; and Respond to climate change and build climate resiliency across the community." So, it's time for wetlands retention, protection and restoration.

As was pointed out by a number of successful candidates during last fall's election campaign, we cannot simply rely on "virtue signalling" that is not followed up by commensurate action.

Some facts about wetlands:

- Wetlands store more carbon than forests.

Peatlands cover 3% of our planet yet store around 30% of all land-based carbon.

Coastal wetlands sequester and store carbon up to 55 times faster than tropical rain forests.

Wetlands, a nature-based solution to climate change, are masters at carbon sequestration, sucking in carbon and storing it in wetland soil.

- Wetlands help us cope with storms and flooding.

Wetlands act like giant sponges.

Inland, a single acre of wetland can absorb up to 1.5 million gallons of floodwater.

When it's dry and the land is parched, wetlands are able to release water back into the environment. This can help keep our forest floors moist and protect against forest fires.

Wetlands are the "kidneys of the planet" – they have the awesome ability to remove pollutants from water thanks to their lush vegetation.

Wetlands are able to get rid of 90% of water-borne pathogens.

Wetlands recharge groundwater and act as natural infrastructure to clean stormwater.

- Wetlands are being lost three times faster than forests.

They're the Earth's most threatened ecosystem.

More than 80% of all wetlands have disappeared since the 1700s.

The trend is accelerating. Since 1970, at least 35% of the world's wetlands have been lost.

- Human activities are driving wetland degradation.

Wetlands are being drained and filled in for urban construction and agriculture.

Water pollution and over-fishing are harming wetland ecosystems, along with invasive species (including humans).

Other human activities negatively impacting our sensitive environmental areas include: riparian removal, channelization/dyking, urbanization, the introduction of EIAs ("effective impermeable areas"/development), water diversions/manipulation of water flow, degraded water quality (e.g. water chemistry and nutrients), logging and other forms vegetation removal, commercial and recreational development/overdevelopment.

- Wetland species are facing extinction.

Wetlands are one of Earth's most productive ecosystems and support an incredible amount of biodiversity, including waterfowl and a variety of migratory and year-round birds and bats.

Fish species, frogs, turtles, muskrats, minks, shrews and beavers are also long-term residents (for example, the Godman Wetlands are known to be home to the endangered Pacific Water Shrew.)

Wetlands are a favourite ecosystem of osprey, eagles and hawks.

Wetlands also feature a wide assortment of aquatic invertebrates that form the base of this ecosystem's food chain.

One in three freshwater species and 25% of all wetland species face actual extinction from wetland decline.

81% of inland wetland species and 36% of coastal and marine species have declined in the last 50 years.

Today Feb 3 is the staff deadline for Budget questions from West Van residents. Starting last weekend (Jan 28-29) I sent various questions to staff (including yourself), but I have not received any replies. Hence this follow-up email.

What direction did you get from Council before you publicly released this Staff led budget?

In the context that West Van's population is relatively unchanged and there are various job cuts in the local economy, I note that you are proposing to hire an additional 14 - 15 people. Can you please provide a brief but detailed summary of the rationale for each of these 14 new employees (FTEs)?

I see the contractors have left the renovated north Municipal Building and so employees are now free to work in the building. Recently during a recent weekday afternoon, I looked at the top and second floors that have new carpeting, new furniture and computer equipment. But I couldn't see anyone on either floor, so it appears that most staff are still working at home. I note that Federal and Provincial governments appear to require their employees to attend their workplace at least 3 days per week. Can you please send me your current policy on the number of days per week that employees are required to attend their workplace versus remote work at home?

Mismatch of temporary interest revenue versus permanent staff expense: While much higher interest rate revenue may help to fund these 14 new permanent employees, the most of the current windfall interest rate revenue is not permanent and will dissipate over the next 18 months.

I look forward to hearing back from you with the information I have asked for in the next few days.

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To our esteemed Mayor, council, staff and CAO

The year is 2023. Massive amounts of inflation plague the country; interest and mortgage rates are on the rise and incomes are not increasing at anywhere near the rate of inflation.

As a long standing property owner and resident of West Vancouver the idea of a 6% property tax increase with additional increases to utilities is a frightening and triggering prospect for our family.

At some point property taxes versus inflation became a talking point and while inflation should be considered the real question that needs to be asked and debated is; "Is it sustainable to have property tax increases exceed inflationary wage raises of workers?"

My wife works for the second second and I am employed at a second second

Since we purchased our home our property taxes have gone from around to s. 22(1) which is a 97% increase over 14 years while our wages maybe increased by 18-20% during that same period of time. According to your website the difference between our property tax for 2021 vs 2022 was 10.57% alone!!! Combine that with utilities costs we expect to pay over in fees. That is the equivalent of over 1/3rd of my wife's after tax income and 1/7th of our families after tax income. Does that sound in anyway reasonable when our original cost s.22(1) was 1/16.5th of our families after tax income??? I would assert NO, but we absolutely must keep these proportions relevant YOY.

In my opinion it is both irresponsible and harmful to vote for a progressive and excessive property tax increase when the average worker's wages and cashflow simply cannot keep up with the cost of living here in WV We need to end this budgetary malpractice urgently and get back to a balanced budget.

Furthermore like many who live here; I am of the opinion West Vancouver is well over staffed. We are spending irresponsibly and well beyond our means. We should be reducing staff to bring our budget back down into a sustainable model where employees, retirees and families can continue to afford live here without getting taxed out of their homes and municipality.

Young families like mine are fleeing WV to go where the cost of living is more reasonable. We cannot defer our taxes, we cannot magically earn more money to pay for increases above the rate to which we get annual increases. We cannot take out loans to pay our property taxes. Our only options are to either suffer and pay or to flee elsewhere.

As a new council I implore you to take charge of these matters and:
Vote NO to any new staff
Vote NO to property tax increase for 2023
Vote YES to a new finance and budget committee
Vote YES to extensive budget review and reform
Vote YES to directing the CAO to reduce staff

Please pass bylaw's that make it sustainable in the long term for families like mine to continue to live in West Vancouver.

Dear Mayor & Council,

I wish to comment on the proposed 2023 Budget.

At this time, many Canadians are struggling with inflation and significant rises in essentials such as food, utility and travel costs. Those who are in employment are seeing their real incomes fall. The elderly, living on fixed incomes, are particularly hard hit and have little headroom to make ends meet and pay increased taxes. This is a time for prudent governance and certainly not a time for taxes to be raised.

In a time of falling incomes most businesses take action to cut costs by reducing product/service offerings and reducing staff to ensure the business can survive. West Vancouver is a service provider and should be making meaningful cuts to many services,. especially those which are "nice to have", but not essential. In particular there must be a significant reduction in staff numbers, which is the highest contributor to costs. It is unthinkable that Staff should be seeking an increase in numbers at this time and council should direct each department to propose where cuts can be made and/or where redistribution of headcount can ensure essential services are minimally impacted, but the "nice to have" non-essential programs are deleted.

In the recent election I and many others voted for major changes in Council membership and the position of Mayor. All of the new Council members and Mayor indicated that fiscal responsibility was their major focus. The proposed 2023 Budget has been drawn up by Staff, presumably with little input from the new Council. I would ask that Councillors respect their election pledges and ensure that the proposed Budget is not approved

and an immediate headcount freeze be put in place. Staff should be instructed to categorize, with priority weighting, essential services and determine where reductions can be made. A significantly reduced emergency budget could be put in place to cover a reasonable time period until a new Budget is brought forward and discussed and approved by Council, after sharing of the arguments with the electorate. It feels to many concerned citizens in West Vancouver that it is Staff who are running the Council and not our elected representatives. Please stand up and reconfirm your election pledges and not confirm the current Budget as proposed.

Thank you for the opportunity to present on behalf of the OGCS in January. Since the animation didn't properly show David's study area, I thought the image below would be helpful. The study area is exclusively municipal land and excludes the cabin area, previously cleared private land and the Metro Vancouver Watershed.

Thank you for considering protection for the area. It has much of value, including hiking trails, most of which are over 30 years old, mountain bike trails, some of which are over 30 years old, and many, many veteran old-growth trees, some of which may well be over a thousand years old.

In addition to broad community appeal, there are many policies and recommendations that support taking action to protect old growth in West Vancouver

Official Community Plan, 2018

Policy 2.6.16 - Protect the remaining old-growth forests in recognition of their ecological importance and values through appropriate regulations and education.

Upper Lands Working Group, 2015

Recommendation 3.1.1.2 - Municipally owned lands above 1200 feet be permanently protected as dedicated parkland.

Parks Master Plan Working Group, 2012

Recommendation 2.2.8 - Recommend that a high-level environmental inventory be conducted as part of the Upper Lands Study to generally identify lands which could be considered for future park protection.

Referendum, Bylaw No. 3841, 1993

Question #2 - Are you in favour of Continuing Studies by the district that could lead to further Park Dedication by referendum, of Municipally owned Mountain lands containing Old Growth Trees or significant Ecological Features.







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Dear Mayor and Council,

Parliament reconvened in wintery Ottawa on January 30th for what will be a <u>busy winter and spring session</u>. From easing the rising cost of living due to global inflation, working with provinces to sustain and improve healthcare, and taking continued action on climate change, reconciliation, and more, we have an extensive docket of legislation to debate in the coming months.

Having been back in BC for much of this past month, I've had the opportunity to connect with constituents right across the riding. For the first time in three years, we were able to host our annual Constituency Office Open House, and our first 2023 Constituency Youth Council meeting in-person, where I had the opportunity to meet some amazing young people keen on making a difference in each region of our riding.

This month, we marked Lunar New Year, and it was a real treat to, for the first time in four years, participate in a celebration in West Vancouver to kick off celebrations, <u>followed on the 22nd with a parade</u> with the Prime Minister, the Premier, the Mayor of Vancouver, and many thousands more.

I joined parliamentarians from Canada and around the world to sponsor, raise awareness, and demand for the release of individual detainees and political prisoners in Iran. I am politically sponsoring Mehdi Memar Rast and Mohsen Rezazadeh Gharagholou. Canada and the world are watching.

On January 20, I was able to <u>announce an important investment</u> of \$393,139 for the Sunshine Coast Community Services Society and Sea to Sky Community Services Society under the fourth phase of the <u>Local Food Infrastructure Fund</u>. This funding will be used to reduce food insecurity in our communities by establishing and strengthening local food systems for the long-term. January also saw the settlement of the class action lawsuit of Indigenous nations, including the shishalh nation, that were forced to attend "Day Schools", where their language, culture and heritage was severely impacted and sometimes irreparably damaged. I want to honour the long and hard work done by the nation, and especially former hiwus Garry Feschuk in obtaining justice for the nation for unspeakable harms committed.

As of January 31st, simple possession of small amounts of certain controlled substances are no longer subject to criminal penalties. This is in response to an <u>application by the Province of BC</u> to ensure that people can get the help they need to help combat the opioid epidemic, where over six people are passing away each day. This measure will focus on implementing a health based response, while importing, exporting manufacturing and trafficking in any amounts remains illegal. 

Announcing investments to increase food security on the Sunshine Coast & Sea to Sky



On behalf of Minister Marie-Claude Bibeau, Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food, I announced an investment of up to \$393,139 for <u>Sunshine Coast Community Services Society (SCCS)</u> and <u>Sea to Sky Community Services Society (SSCS)</u>.

The SCCSS will fund kitchen and processing equipment, among other items so they can continue being a low-barrier service provider serving multiple underserved populations. The SSCS will receive funding to purchase equipment for its new Pemberton Food Bank kitchen, helping those most in need.

This is part of our government's Local Food Infrastructure Fund which is supporting 900 growth-generating food security projects across the country.

Decriminalization of Certain Controlled Substances in British Columbia

The decriminalization of certain illegal substances in British Columbia has now gone into effect as of January 31.

With over six people dying every day, the toxic drug supply and overdose crisis is the leading cause of unnatural death in BC. While the threat of criminalization does not prevent substance use, it leads many to hide it, to use alone where they cannot be helped, and to avoid seeking treatment. People who use drugs - who are our friends, family and neighbours - don't deserve to be jailed or to live with the associated stigma for the rest of their lives - they deserve medical help.

That is why in May of last year, we worked with municipalities, Indigenous partners, public health officials, law enforcement, and people with lived experience to review and approve the BC government's application for a three year decriminalization period.

Adults now found to be possessing certain controlled substances up to a collective total of 2.5 grams will not be subject to federal criminal charges, but rather will be given information on where to find help. Meanwhile trafficking, producing, importing and exporting controlled substances in any amount continues to be illegal.

This is a key part of our efforts towards harm reduction, reducing stigma and ensuring criminalization is no longer a barrier to avoid seeking help and medical treatment. This measure is an important, evidence-based step towards mitigating the tragic overdose crisis in our province. We will be closely and publicly sharing data on how this measure contributes to helping tackle this crisis, while we continue to increase the health and social service supports to BC to collectively ensure that those suffering get the help they need.

EXEMPTION FROM THE CONTROLLED DRUGS AND SUBSTANCES ACT:

PERSONAL POSSESSION OF SMALL AMOUNTS OF CERTAIN ILLEGAL DRUGS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA (JANUARY 31, 2023 TO JANUARY 31, 2026)

The Province of British Columbia requested a subsection 56[1] exemption under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act (CDSA). After a thorough assessment, this exemption was granted by the federal Minister of Mental Health and Addictions and Associate Minister of Health to support the province in implementing its comprehensive public health response to the overdose crisis.



Adults 18+ in BC



WHEN

From January 31, 2023 until January 31, 2026



WHERE

The province of BC only



WHAT

Adults 18+ in BC will not be arrested or charged for the possession of a cumulative amount of up to 2.5 grams of these illegal drugs for personal use:

- Opioids (including heroin, morphine, and fentanyl)
- ► Cocaine (including crack and powder cocaine)
- ► Methamphetamine (meth)
- ► MDMA (ecstasy)

Evidence on effective and safe threshold amounts of these drugs is limited. As this is the **first exemption of its kind in Canada**, ongoing monitoring will inform if it is contributing to its objectives which includes reducing stigma and substance use harms and increasing access to health and social services for people who use drugs in BC.

WHAT REMAINS ILLEGAL IN BC

Unless authorized, any amount of illegal drugs, including the four listed in the exemption, cannot be possessed

- in and surrounding elementary and secondary schools and child care facilities
- ▶ in airports

and cannot be

- ▶ imported or exported
- ▶ produced
- given away, administered, supplied or sold
- ▶ sent or delivered
- used while operating a motor vehicle or watercraft



WHY

This is an additional tool that the federal government is providing to BC to help address substance use harms, reduce stigma and prevent overdose deaths. **Ultimately, the goal is to save lives**. The Government of Canada continues to take a comprehensive approach to addressing substance use harms and the overdose crisis.

Parliamentary Updates

With the end of January, I am back in Ottawa to work on both the Standing Committees on Indigenous and Northern Affairs (INAN) and Environment and Sustainable Development (ENVI). On INAN, I'm excited to be continuing work on a new study on the decline of

Indigenous Languages with the intention of analyzing the effectiveness of the *Indigenous Languages Act* in helping Indigenous people in reclaiming, revitalizing, maintaining, and strengthening Indigenous languages. This work is vital in working to repair the damage caused by residential schools to Indigenous languages and people. I'm especially eager to hear about successful efforts at revitalizing Indigenous languages from across the country and how we can learn from Indigenous nations on preserving and protecting these languages.

On ENVI we are continuing the clause-by-clause process on Bill S-5, The Canadian Environmental Protection Act. Before the holidays, I was successful in passing an amendment to expand the right to a healthy environment and will be continuing that work over the next few weeks. I am committed to continuing to strengthen this bill and ensure that Canada has a strong and effective environmental protection regime.

In the House of Commons, debate will also be continuing on some important legislation. This includes Bill C-35, the Canada Early Learning and Child Care Act, which once passed will protect access to affordable, inclusive, and high-quality early learning and childcare for years to come. This legislation will make it harder for any future government to cancel or cut child care and undo the progress we've made for children and families. Fees for regulated child care across Canada have already been cut by at least 25%, and will be cut by 50% on average by the end of the month. These reductions amount to average savings of hundreds of dollars a month for families, and show that we're well on our way to delivering an average of \$10-a-day child care by 2026.

Bill C-22, the Canada Disability Benefit Act, will also be debated in the House and, once passed, will create a new benefit for Canadians living with disabilities that will work in conjunction with existing benefits and become an important part of Canada's social safety net, alongside Old Age Security, the Guaranteed Income Supplement and the Canada Child Benefit. It has the potential to significantly reduce poverty for hundreds of thousands of Canadians with disabilities.

Community Updates from the Sunshine Coast

As mentioned previously, on January 20th I had the great pleasure of announcing a federal funding investment of \$257,639 to Sunshine Coast Community Services (SCCS) under Phase 4 of the Local Food Infrastructure Fund.

It is more critical than ever to support community-led projects like the ones that will be included in SCCS's Building Together project, a project that will include two stories of social services and four stories of affordable housing for women and children.

This funding will go towards equipment for a commercial kitchen where people can learn how to cook, grow and preserve healthy food. A free store will operate similar to a food bank but allow people to select their own food. The society will also use its many community gardens to teach people how to grow and harvest fruit trees, vegetables and medicinal plants.

Community Updates from the Sea to Sky

It was wonderful to meet both councils in Pemberton and Whistler in January for their Committee of the Whole meetings. I had the opportunity to connect with both councils to have an informal and open discussion about their priorities, upcoming projects, current priorities, and long-term challenges for the upcoming year. It was great to put names to faces of the new council members and reconnect with incumbents.

I was also able to meet with the Squamish Downtown Business Association to hear exciting projects they have upcoming for this year and brainstorm on solutions on how we can continue to support local business in our rural communities.

Settlement Agreement reached in Band Class Litigation

This month, the Minister of Crown–Indigenous Relations, Marc Miller, along with Band class representatives, former Chief Shane Gottfriedson and former Chief Garry Feschuk, announced settlement of the Gottfriedson band class litigation.

This is really important news. Residential and day schools have done irreparable damage to Indigenous languages, cultures and heritage. But this settlement is an Indigenous-led process, including the shíshálh Nation, to heal and revitalize them.

In this settlement, Canada will provide \$2.8 billion to be placed in a not-for-profit trust to support healing, wellness, education, heritage, language, and commemoration activities. This trust will be guided by the Four Pillars developed by the Representative Plaintiffs. These Four Pillars include the revival and protection of Indigenous languages, the revival and protection of Indigenous cultures, the protection and promotion of heritage, and wellness for Indigenous communities and their members.

This announcement builds on the 2021 Gottfriedson Day Scholars Settlement, which provides individual compensation to Day Scholars who attended residential schools but did not reside at the institution.

The residential school system is a shameful part of Canada's colonial history and its consequences are still felt by Survivors, their families, and communities to this day. This settlement will support the Band class members in their healing journeys for generations to come.

International Holocaust Remembrance Day

Every year on January 27th, We Remember the over six million who were persecuted and murdered by the Nazis during the Holocaust - Jews, Roma, LGBT+, disabled people and others. This day was chosen as it is the anniversary of the liberation of the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp.

We recommit to fighting anti-semitism, and emphasize the importance of education so that we can practice #NeverAgain. This includes Holocaust education, prohibiting the denying or downplaying of the Holocaust in Canada and investing in Jewish communities. In BC, the development of a new Jewish Community Centre of Greater Vancouver will house the Vancouver Holocaust Education Centre.
