RE: E-Comm Board of Directors Designate — 2020-2021 Term

The Virtual Annual General Meeting (the “Meeting”) of the Shareholders (Members) of E-Comm *Emergency Communications for British Columbia Inc.* (“E-Comm”) will be held on Thursday, September 17, 2020 and, at that time, the Board of Directors will be elected by the Members for the 2020-2021 term.

Nominee for the coming term to be selected

The Members’ Agreement among E-Comm’s shareholders sets out how the Board of Directors is to be elected. For your reference, we attach a copy of section 4.2 of the Members’ Agreement, headed “Designation and Election of Directors” which contains the applicable provisions.

Your organization falls into the group of which described at subsection 4.2.1.5. Pursuant to Section 4.2.1.5 of the E-Comm Members’ Agreement, your Designated Group of Members is entitled to nominate two mutually agreed upon individuals for election to the Board of Directors of E-Comm. At present, your grouping is comprised of these municipalities:

District of West Vancouver	2	1

The current representative of your group on the E-Comm Board is Richard Walton.

Because your municipality/organization is among a designated group of Members who must mutually agree upon your nominee, **we respectfully request that you confer with the others members of your grouping to confirm your selections for the coming term and provide the names of such individuals not later than August 14, 2020.** This will help to ensure a smooth nomination process.

Who is eligible?

The Board of E-Comm is committed to good governance and seeks directors possess the experience and skills and attributes to effectively serve the interests of all shareholders and our other stakeholders. An effective director will have competencies in many, or most, of the following areas: knowledge of the fields of emergency communications, police, fire, ambulance or public-safety, knowledge of the role of a board, analytical skills including financial acumen, leadership skills, good communication skills, sound judgment, high integrity and the ability to influence others. Further, the Board of Directors believes that its composition should reflect the rich diversity of the communities that E-Comm serves.



Commitment

The E-Comm Board of Directors meets five times per year and provides oversight of the business and affairs of the company. Meetings are held during regular working hours, typically commencing in the morning and running until mid or early afternoon at E-Comm's Vancouver centre. Two additional Board sessions are also held annually for strategic planning and board education. There are three standing committees of the board (Audit, Governance, and Human Resources and Compensation), each meeting five times per year. Participation on committees is voluntary, but recommended.

Although shareholders are required to elect directors every year, we hope that nominees are willing to serve for not less than two years, in part because a learning curve, before a director might feel fully engaged and contributing, is acknowledged. We encourage directors to serve additional terms. There are no term limits in place, although we strive to balance the value of experienced Directors with that of newcomers.

Next steps

We kindly request that the District of West Vancouver, following discussion within your Designated Grouping, advise E-Comm (to the attention of the writer) with written confirmation by August 14, 2020, of the name and contact information of your mutually-agreed upon nominees to the E-Comm Board for the 2020-2021 term. The question and answer document enclosed in this package includes a sample motion confirming your nomination, if required. Virtual meeting details will be shared with your nominees in advance of the AGM.

Please note that nominating a director is a separate process from designating a representative to vote your share at the Virtual Annual General Meeting (AGM) in September. As such, I will be contacting you again in mid-August with the notice of AGM and requesting that you designate one individual to attend the Virtual Annual General Meeting of the Shareholders for the purposes of voting the District of West Vancouver shares. Virtual meeting details will be shared with your voting representative in advance of the AGM.

- 3.7.1 The Company shall enter into the Special User Agreement with the RCMP for the provision of Company Services to the RCMP which agreement will effectively provide that the RCMP will fulfil the financial obligations with respect to Police Services as if it were a Class A Member. The Special User Agreement may be executed between the RCMP, as a Special User, and the Company at any time notwithstanding when the Government Agency established by the Federal government for the purposes of holding a Class A Share in place of the RCMP becomes a Member.
- 3.7.2 Subject to Section 4.11.3, the Company may enter into a Special User Agreement with any Special User in addition to the RCMP for the provision of some or all of the Company Services to that Special User, provided that:
- 3.7.2.1 the Special User has a role in fulfilling the Purpose and the provision of some or all of the Company Services to that Special User would be for the benefit of the public;
 - 3.7.2.2 the E-Comm System and the Company have sufficient capacity to provide the Company Services being requested by the Special User without any significant impairment to the Company Services then being provided to Members and other Special Users, and anticipated to be provided to the Members then holding Class B Shares; and
 - 3.7.2.3 the Special User Agreement effectively provides that the Special User will fulfil its financial obligations with respect to the Company Services received by it as if it were a Class A Member.

Subject to Section 4.11.3, a Special User Agreement may be executed between a Special User and the Company at any time notwithstanding when the Government Agency established for the purposes of holding a Class A Share in place of that Special User becomes a Member.

4. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

4.1 BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Company shall have a Board comprised of not less than three nor more than twenty-five directors, with the actual number of directors as determined by the Class A Members as hereinafter provided.

4.2 DESIGNATION AND ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

- 4.2.1 The Members shall be entitled to designate directors as hereinafter provided:
- 4.2.1.1 one individual designated by the BCAS;
 - 4.2.1.2 one individual designated by Vancouver;
 - 4.2.1.3 one individual designated by the Vancouver Police Board;
 - 4.2.1.4 one individual designated by the following group:

(a) each Police Board which directly holds a Class A Share or Class B Share, other than Vancouver Police Board and Delta Police Board; and

(b) each Police Board which has a Class A Share or Class B Share in respect of Police Services held by its respective municipality, other than Vancouver Police Board and Delta Police Board;

4.2.1.5 such number of individuals as are set forth below, to be designated by the following designated group of Class A Members or Class B Members (each group being called a "Designated Group of Members"), if one or more of the Municipalities within a Designated Group of Members is a Class A Member or a Class B Member, as hereinafter set forth:

1	Maple Ridge, Pitt Meadows and Mission
1	Abbotsford, Chilliwack and Fraser Valley Regional District

and

4.2.1.6 one individual designated by all other Members holding Class A Shares and the GVRD, other than as set forth in Sections 4.2.1.1 to 4.2.1.5, inclusive.

4.2.2 The RCMP, and in replacement therefor upon the Government Agency referred to in Section 3.7.1 becoming a Class A Member, that Government Agency, shall be entitled to designate one individual to act as director;

- 4.2.3 If provided in a Special User Agreement entered into pursuant to Section 3.7.2 or if otherwise authorized by the Board under Section 4.11.3, each Special User, and in replacement therefor upon the Government Agency for that Special User referred to in Section 3.7.2 becoming a Class A Member, that Government Agency, shall be entitled to designate one individual to act as director;
- 4.2.4 The Provincial government, acting through the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General, whether it holds a Class A Share or not, shall be entitled to designate two individuals to act as directors;
- 4.2.5 Subject as hereinafter provided, the directors designated pursuant to Sections 4.2.1, 4.2.2 and 4.2.3 shall designate four additional persons, independent from the Members, to be directors of the Company (the "Independent Directors"), who have an interest or expertise in the Purpose or the Company Services to be provided by the Company.
- 4.2.6 The Members agree to vote their Class A Shares for the election as directors of the persons designated pursuant to Sections 4.2.1, 4.2.2, 4.2.3, 4.2.4 and 4.2.5.
- 4.2.7 For the purposes of Section 4.2.1.5, upon anyone or more Municipalities within a Designated Group of Members becoming a Class A Member or a Class B Member, such Municipality or Municipalities will be entitled to designate the individual to be a director for the purposes of Section 4.2.1.5. As additional Municipalities within that Designated Group of Members become Class A Members or Class B Members, as the case may be, such additional Municipalities shall be deemed to have agreed to the individual as designated and elected a director for that Designated Group of Members and no changes will be required to be made with respect to any such individual, unless such individual shall cease to be a director in any other manner such as resignation, until the next following annual general meeting or annual consent resolution. Prior to any annual general meeting or annual consent resolution of the Class A Members, a Designated Group of Members shall agree on the individual to be designated by them for the purpose of Section 4.2.1.5 within a time period sufficient for that individual's name to be placed before the Class A Members, as determined by the Board.

4.3 VACANCIES ON BOARD

Any vacancies on the Board created by an individual designated under Section 4.2.1, 4.2.2, 4.2.3 or 4.2.4 shall be filled by an individual designated by the Member or Members who designated the individual who is no longer a director, the Special User who designated the individual who is no longer a director, or the Provincial government, as the case may be, and any vacancies in any Independent Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors in accordance with Section 4.2.5.

4.4 NO RESTRICTIONS ON AFFILIATION TO MEMBERS

Directors designated pursuant to Section 4.2.1 may be appointed or elected officials from a Member or may be persons from the general public with no affiliation to a Member.

Board of Directors: Common Questions & Background

Q. How should the nominating resolution of our council/board read?

- A. Exact wording is at the discretion of your organization, however council/board motions should include the name of the nominee, specification of the E-Comm Board term (e.g. 2020-2021) and reference to election at the Annual General Meeting of E-Comm shareholders.

For example “THAT (enter municipality/board/organization) nominate (name) to serve as the nominee of municipality/board/organization) to the E-Comm Board of Directors for the 2020-2021 term, such Board to be elected by E-Comm shareholders at the September 17, 2020 Annual General Meeting.”

Q. What is the role of the E-Comm Board of Directors?

- A. The E-Comm Board of Directors is responsible for stewardship of the entire E-Comm organization – it provides strategic oversight of the business and affairs of the company. E-Comm Directors are also the most senior representatives of the organization to the public and our stakeholders. To conduct its work efficiently, the Board has three standing committees: Audit, Governance and Human Resources and Compensation.

Q. Who elects the Board of Directors?

- A. The Shareholders elect the Board of Directors at the Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Company. A Members’ Agreement among the shareholders sets out who may select nominees to the Board of Directors. Nominating entities are expected to select their nominee and advise the E-Comm Assistant Corporate Secretary of the name of their nominee by August 14, 2020 – the candidate is then put forward for election by the shareholders-at-large at the AGM in September 2020.

Q. What time commitment is required of Directors?

- A: The Board holds five regular meetings each year, during business days, typically for four hours. The meeting schedule is published well in advance. The Board Committees also meet five times each year, during the business day, for approximately two hours each meeting.

Two additional half day sessions occur annually: a Board education and orientation session and a strategic planning session.

As a best governance practice, the Board does expect a high attendance rate from its Directors.

Q. Why is the Board of Directors term only one year? Can we nominate someone for more than one term?

- A. The E-Comm Corporate Articles specify a term of one year. Nominating Entities may advise the Corporate Secretary in writing if they wish their nominee’s name to stand for election for a specific number of terms (e.g. four). However, the Corporate Secretary must confirm in writing each year that

the standing nomination remains intact, however there will be no further action for the Nominating Entity unless they wish to make a change from their previous direction.

In the case of Nominating Entities that are part of a grouping, the Assistant Corporate Secretary must receive written confirmation from each nominating entity of the standing nomination, including specification of number of terms. The direction must be consistent among all members of the grouping; otherwise all members of the grouping must be contacted each year asking for confirmation of the nomination.

Q. If my organization/municipality is part of a grouping, do we have to agree on the nominee?

A. The E-Comm Members' Agreement specifies that each designated group of members shall agree on their individual nominee. Consultation on a mutually-agreeable nominee should be undertaken prior to advising the E-Comm Corporate Secretary of the name of the nominee.

Q. What is the difference between nominating a Board Director and sending someone to the AGM?

A. The individual board nominees, once elected at the AGM, will serve on E-Comm's Board throughout the coming year, attending various board and committee meetings, and participating in the supervision of the organization's affairs. Your organization's representative at the AGM is simply the person who attends the AGM that day on behalf of your organization, and votes your share on any resolutions or votes which occur at the AGM that day. That person's role and duties cease after the AGM has adjourned.

Q. Why do you contact us in March when the Board is not appointed by Shareholders until June?

A. We provide sufficient notice of the process to allow for conferring with other members of member groupings, council and or other motions that may be required.

Q. What do directors receive for remuneration?

A. Meeting rates are \$397 per meeting (for Directors who are not full-time employees of a Member, the Provincial Government or Special User), twice that amount for meetings longer than four hours in duration. Board meetings are generally less than four hours.

About the annual general meeting

Q. What is an AGM?

A. A general meeting of all shareholders of E-Comm is required to occur at least once annually under the Business Corporations Act (BC), which regulates E-Comm’s corporate governance.

Q. What happens at an AGM?

A. The compulsory items on the agenda are the election of directors, the appointment (or reappointment) of the auditors, and the presentation of previous year’s financial statements. Usually, a number of additional items are also placed on the agenda, such as a general report from the directors, or presentations on new initiatives. Special business items could also be dealt with (such as changing the Corporate Articles), but shareholders would receive notice of any special business with the notice of meeting.

Q. Who should attend AGM?

A. A representative of the shareholder should attend the AGM to vote on the matters listed above including electing the board of directors.

Q. What are shareholders entitled to vote on?

A. Holders of Class A shares have one vote per share on all matters requiring a vote at the AGM, including any items of special business. Class B shares are generally non-voting, except for matters which involve certain fundamental changes – these are listed and specified in the E-Comm Corporate Articles.

Q. What is the voting process at the AGM?

A. Votes are conducted by a simple show of hands (voting cards) unless a shareholder demands at the meeting that a formal ballot or “poll” vote occur on a particular resolution.

Q. What if no one can attend, can we proxy our vote?

A. Yes. A shareholder can appoint a proxyholder (in writing) to attend and vote on the shareholder’s behalf at the AGM. The proxyholder need not be a member themselves.

Proxies must be in writing, must specify the name of the shareholder, the identity of the proxyholder, and reference the AGM in question. They must be signed by an authorized signatory of the shareholder. Proxies must be pre-registered with E-Comm at least 3 business days prior to the AGM.

Q. How will my shares be voted if I return a proxy?

A. Proxies usually grant the proxyholder the ability to vote on all matters at the meeting, in their discretion. If a shareholder wishes, it can restrict that discretionary power by stating in the proxy form that its

shares must be voted in a certain manner on specified resolutions or votes which it anticipates will be before the meeting. Such language, if included, needs to be clear and unambiguous.

Q. Can a proxy be revoked?

A. Once granted, proxies can also be revoked, but written revocation signed by the shareholder must be given to E-Comm at least one business day prior to the AGM.

Q. Who chairs the AGM?

A. E-Comm's Corporate Articles specify that the chair of the Board of Directors will also chair the AGM.

Q. How important is it that we send someone?

A. As a shareholder of E-Comm we strongly urge in-person attendance to ensure shares are represented.

Subject: New safety fence at WV Community Center

Hello Mayor and Council

Although I was against spending almost 100K to install a new fence during Covid financial difficulties, I assumed the District would supervise the installation to ensure the new fence met guidelines. One stated objective was to ensure soccer balls would not penetrate the fence and roll onto Marine Drive. The fence is partially installed and it was obvious the gap between the cables is too large. This afternoon I tested a fully inflated, adult soccer ball (8 1/4 " diameter) and it easily flows between the cables (10in spacing). More concerning, junior soccer balls-the type used by 12 years and younger are even smaller (7.5") with more room to penetrate the fence. In addition, because of the rolling terrain, the gap between the bottom cable is even larger (1.5 feet) at the west end of the fence.

The fence as installed does not meet design objectives and installation should be suspended until a remedy is found. I trust the District will not be on the hook for any additional costs associated with rectifying this mistake.

- Since it is a private contractor for a multi-family building at [REDACTED] s. 22(1), they said the property owner would be contacted.
- Next I was told the Bylaw officers do not work when the noise violations occur early in the morning & I should call the WV Police.

It is Sunday morning, (August 2, 2020) of a long weekend and Maple Leaf Disposal was outside my window on the adjacent property at 7:05 AM collecting the "Green Waste"

This company collects Garbage EVERY Saturday morning early + EVERY Sunday morning with complete disrespect for WV Municipal Bylaws. Here are your NOISE BYLAWS. They frequently arrive on Saturday morning & other weekdays before 7:30 AM.

Part 5 General Regulations

5.1 No person shall make or cause, or permit to be made or caused, any noise or sound which:

5.1.1 disturbs or is liable to disturb the quiet, peace, rest, enjoyment, comfort, or convenience of individuals or the public; or


5.1.2 exceeds the Sound Levels prescribed in this Bylaw.

Bylaw 4500

(d) Noises or sounds from the loading or unloading of goods, materials, machines, equipment, waste or garbage by any means:

(i) on a Sunday or holiday;

(ii) before 0730 hours (7:30 a.m.) or after 1800 hours (6:00 p.m.) on any other day that is not a Sunday or holiday.



The solution to this problem is very simple. They need to be fined!

4521, 2007

- 10.1 Every person who violates a provision of this bylaw, or who consents, allows or permits an act or thing to be done in violation of a provision of this bylaw, or who neglects or refrains from doing anything required by a provision of this bylaw, is guilty of an offence and is liable, upon summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding \$10,000 and not less than \$2,500.
- 10.2 Each day that a violation continues or exists under this bylaw is a separate offence.
- 10.3 No person may interfere with an Enforcement Officer in issuing a ticket or bylaw notice or otherwise carrying out his or her duties in accordance with this bylaw, and it is an offence for any person to interfere with an Enforcement Officer in the enforcement of this bylaw.
- 10.4 No person shall interfere with or obstruct the entry of the Enforcement Officer onto any land, into any building, or any vehicle to which entry is made or attempted pursuant to the provisions of this bylaw.

I am requesting a written answer on how you plan to STOP the noise violations.

My questions for you are:




Briefly, at an in camera mtg Ccl voted to demolish the house -- probably one of the most significant heritage assets we have (built by Welsh immigrant John Thomas in 1874; oldest continuously inhabited house in the Lower mainland; married a Musqueam woman; John Lawson bought it 1905/7#, now Lawson Park, etc).

The minutes just say I commented on the NJH. For the record, here's what I said:

Mark Panneton, Legislative Services: am thrilled to report we hv our first ever 'telephone-in' speaker, Carolanne Reynolds, on line, ... just going to go on mute for a moment then she can address Ccl.

... go ahead, Ms R

CR: Good evening. Thank you for this opportunity.

First of all, welcome to our new CAO, Mr Bartlett.

My name is Carolanne Reynolds, editor of the West Van Matters newsletter and chair of Heritage West Van.

As you wd guess, as the first mbr of WV Ccl for heritage in 1988, it has remained an important issue for me, and not just as a Canadian after my travels.

...

In early 1990, the Director of Planning and I went to the Navy Jack House to confirm the agreement with the owner, Lloyd Williams, who alas, died just a couple of years ago, after living there for 50 years, and his daughter called me the other day.

This asset is perhaps almost the most valuable of all the heritage buildings we have. Its significance is greater than the Ferry Bldg, the Music Box, and the Silk Purse -- all worthy (don't get me wrong, they're great too), but the Navy Jack House, since it involves not just that it was built in 1874 with old-growth timber, is the longest inhabited home in BC, but also it was the home of a pioneer, a Welsh immigrant, John Thomas, "Navy Jack" he was called (he ran a ferry service for a while, and had something known as Navy Jack gravel, still used for construction), and his wife was a Musqueam, so in addition, has a connection to our local and first culture.

John Lawson bought the property in 1906, hence the name of the park.

Being told that Ccl had decided to demolish the house was obviously a shocking, devastating blow.

*It is my hope that the future of this historic place will be considered with due respect for its place in West Vancouver's heritage. Rest assured, there are many who wd be only too happy to assist in any way. **Let us work together so this significant vestige of our past is honoured, not lost.***

Can we count on you?

MP: ... still hv 30 more seconds; anything else you wanted to add?

CR: No, no, that's fine, but someone might hv some Qs.

MP: Mayor, any Qs?

Mayor: tyvm. No, this is on our Consent Agenda for July 20, so Ccl will be speaking to it then

CR: what is on the agenda for July 20?

Mayor: This matter will be on the agenda

CR: you mean the NJH?

Mayor: yes.

CR: oh great -- so we can recommend ppl get info to Ccl before then?

Mayor: yes

CR: that's great; will there be any group to be looking at it?

MP: you'll wait for the report

CR: oh, there'll be a report; that's great -- well, tyvm

Not the end of the story, let's hope it's the beginning of a new happy story

MP: thank you

Mayor: thank you for calling in.

Perhaps they'll discuss it??? Bit worrisome is that it just has "rec'd for information" wch cd mean nothing can be done about it.

Many citizens are anxious about the future and not necessarily that it be a Nature House, but essential it be preserved.

Keep in mind that it was lived in till Lloyd died in 2017 -- then was in care of DWV. Does that mean no maintenance was done so that now restoration is needed?

Maybe a company wd like to estimate how much it wd cost and even do it as a donation or for the publicity and gratitude of saving such an important/significant WV heritage asset.

We can hope/dream, can't we?

More diverse housing for a broader demographic.

Preserving values in people's homes.

Lack of consideration for neighbours by architects and builders.

Importance of property values.

Rights of property owners.

Need for neighbour consideration.

District's zoning bylaw primarily regulates lot size, lot coverage and size of homes that can be built.

The above are comments included in the draft recommendations of the "Neighbourhood Character Working Group". Although the focus of these recommendations is on single family areas these statements must also apply to all West Vancouver residents who live in condominium buildings.

The Hollyburn Properties development at 21st Street and 22nd Street shows such blatant disregard for residents residing in the lower level suites at 195 21st Street that is it shocking such a development was approved by Mayor and Council. This cannot be allowed to be repeated on other sites.

Now the proposed development of the duplex zoned property at 2204 Bellevue Avenue/177 22nd Street has gone forward to the public consultation process despite the developer wanting to place an 8 storey apartment building on a site that is only suited to a townhouse. The proposed 8 storey building does not meet a number of zoning bylaws.

These are:


1. 302.04 the site width for apartment buildings must be a minimum of 30.2 meters; this site is 21.7 meters at the front and 19.42 meters at the rear.
2. 302.05 the floor ratio for an apartment building must be a maximum of 1.89 for a high performance building; this building is 2.4.
3. 302.07 the front yard must be a minimum of 7.6 meters; this site is 6 meters.
4. 302.8 the rear yard must be a minimum of 9.1 meters; this site is 6 meters.
5. 302.09 (2) (a) the side yard must be 4.5 meters on both sides plus 1.5 meters for each of floors 4 thru 7; this site has 1.5 meters on the west side and 3 meters on the east side. (b) the combined side yard shall be equal to at least twice the width of the building – this building's width is 14.95 meters.
6. 302.10 an apartments building's maximum width is $\frac{1}{2}$ the width of the site: this site is 21.7 meters on the north and 19.42 meters on the south; this building's width is 14.95 meters.

The luxury apartments in this building would provide homes to 7 owners who could afford their multi-million dollar price. That it is a mass timber building is no reason to allow zoning bylaws to be ignored. The proposed building design shows a lack of consideration for neighbours by affecting views and therefore property values. The lack of consideration for neighbouring condo owners and their rights is, quite simply, NOT acceptable.

The proposed development for 2204 Bellevue/177 22nd Street should be required to meet current zoning bylaws, should be required to maintain the long standing view corridor and should be required to wait until the Ambleside Town Centre Local Area Plan has gone through the public process and been approved.

I am strongly opposed to this project going forward in it's current form.



Dear Mayor Booth and Council,

I read with interest a piece in the 24 June edition of the NS News that the District of North Vancouver will no longer be using rodenticides at its own facilities to control rat populations.

And that they are hoping the idea will spread. So here I am. Your very own "Johnny Appleseed"!

I think West Vancouver could use a little upgrade on our commitment to Nature, in general and Biodiversity, in particular. Given that Canada was the first industrialized nation to sign the UN Convention on Biodiversity and we have hosted the Secretariat for the past 23 years, it seems somewhat hypocritical that any local governance uses rodenticides at public facilities, not to mention in or at our places of learning. And I do believe we use poison in our schools to deal with mice and rat issues. Correct me if I'm wrong.

There are numerous organizations working to spread the word about not only the inhumane practice of poisoning rodents but the unintended consequences of secondary poisoning as a result of this practice. Owl Watch BC is one, whose founders, both North Van residents, brought this issue to the attention of the DNV, resulting in the ban.

I understand that an outright ban is under the Province's jurisdiction, however if every municipality took responsibility for their own domain, it may well start the process and a serious conversation about not relying on such a cruel and destructive practice that, in fact, has never eliminated the problem. Who keeps repeating the same practice, hoping the results will be different?! Not us, surely!

But consider this. We live on the cusp of the wilderness and that is why many of us choose to live here. Owls are the finest rat catchers nature has provided. Yet when we poison the rat, the owl, unknowingly eats it and dies. A slow and painful death. Another link in the web is broken.

But not just owls, all raptors, and any opportunistic creature who is looking for a free lunch. Like your dog or mine.

The good news? There are solutions. Indeed, the Small Business BC Awards have a nominee under the Best Youth Entrepreneur, who founded an organization called Humane Solutions. I checked them out online and on the BBB site. Check them out yourself.

I look forward to hearing from one or all of you, my elected representatives. We can do better, individually and collectively. And we should. We are a privileged community and with that privilege comes responsibility. Lets be leaders. I, for one, hate following the pack. How about you?



Dear Mayor and Council,

As we head into the BC Day long weekend, I know many of us are eager to take advantage of the good weather and the great outdoors. While we have flattened the curve in BC to date, we have seen in the past weeks an uptick in COVID-19 cases, emphasizing the importance of continuing to follow the advice of our public health officials.

As we cautiously re-open our economy, I am working with all levels of government, businesses, non-profits and constituents across our riding to advocate for our community's priorities and ensure our riding has the resources needed to address the long-term impacts of the pandemic. Over the last few weeks, there have been a number of important developments to our response to the COVID-19 pandemic that I would like to relay to you.

On July 16th, we announced a historic [federal investment](#) of more than \$19 billion to help provinces and territories safely restart their economies and make our country more resilient to possible future waves of the virus. This [Safe Restart Agreement](#) has been agreed to by all of Canada's First Ministers and will help address the key priorities for the safe restart of

Canada's economy over the next six to eight months. It will support measures to increase testing and contact tracing of the virus to protect Canadians from a future outbreak, and support the capacity of our health care systems, including services for people facing mental health challenges. It will also assist with the procurement of personal protective equipment to help our essential workers, and in protecting the most vulnerable.

The Agreement secures \$7 billion for Canada's towns and cities, including [\\$2 billion to help municipalities](#) with COVID-19 operating costs, to help with things like putting in place safety measures to minimize the spread of COVID-19, and managing public spaces and critical services.

We are also providing \$1.8 billion in support of transit operations, including a \$540 million federal investment in British Columbia transit through a federal-provincial cost-matching agreement, which will provide new operational funding for BC Transit, TransLink, and local governments who need support due to ridership declines caused by COVID-19.

An essential part of a safe and effective economic restart is ensuring parents have enough childcare support, which is why included in the Safe Restart Agreement is \$625 million in federal support for [Canada's child care sector](#). This will help ensure that safe and sufficient child care spaces are available to support parents' gradual return to work.

The [Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy](#) (CEWS), which has supported over 3 million Canadian workers stay on the payroll, has been extended until December 19, 2020. Changes have been introduced to ensure that all eligible employers facing a revenue loss can qualify and a top-up subsidy will be implemented to those who have been the hardest hit by the pandemic. More information about these announced changes can be found [here](#).

We know this pandemic has deeply affected the lives and health of all Canadians, and disproportionately affected Canadians with disabilities. Last month, we announced a one-time, tax-free payment of \$600 to support Canadians with disabilities with extraordinary expenses incurred during the pandemic. [As part of Bill C-20](#), we are providing this payment to include 1.7 million Canadians with disabilities.

We have also [extended](#) the [Canada Emergency Commercial Rent Assistance](#) program until the end of August. I have heard from many businesses that continue to be concerned about the impacts of commercial rent in light of financial windfalls going forward in the months to come. Please know that I hear you and am continuing to advocate for solutions for small businesses in our community.

Earlier this month, Natural Resources Minister Seamus O'Regan [announced](#) a \$30 million investment to offset additional costs associated with COVID-19 safety measures for small and medium enterprises in the forest sector, including tree-planting operations. We will continue to support different sectors that face unique financial challenges from the pandemic.

In light of continuing circumstances south of the border, the Canada-US border agreement, banning all non-essential travel, has been extended to August 21 to keep residents in both our countries safe and healthy. Further extensions to this agreement will be made in due course. Further, as of July 31, the Canada Border Services Agency is [implementing stricter rules](#) and additional entry conditions on travellers transiting through Canada to Alaska for a non-discretionary purpose. These new measures are being put in place to further reduce the risk of introduction of COVID-19 cases and to minimize the amount of time that in-transit travellers are in Canada.

Finally, we have now in collaboration with other orders of government and across sectors developed a new nation-wide mobile app to let users know if they may have been exposed to COVID-19. The [COVID Alert app](#) is available to all Canadians for free download in the [App Store](#) and [Google Play Store](#). The app uses strong measures to protect the privacy and confidentiality of any data it collects and does not track a user's location or collect personally identifiable information. While the app's integration with health systems is currently limited to Ontario, you are welcome to download the app now in anticipation of a full roll out in the rest of the country.

Government Support for Individuals

Canada's COVID-19 Economic Response Plan provides direct support for Canadian workers and businesses. For more information on these measures please see <https://www.canada.ca/en/department-finance/economic-response-plan.html>.

The package of measures includes:

- The **Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB)** - a \$2000/month benefit available between March 15-October 3, 2020 for up to 24 weeks to Canadians whose jobs have been impacted due to COVID-19 and meeting the following eligibility requirements:
 - live in Canada and are at least 15 years old
 - stopped working because of COVID-19 or are eligible for EI regular or sickness benefits
 - have not voluntarily quit their job
 - had income of at least \$5,000 in 2019 or in the 12 months prior to the date of their application.
 - For at least 14 days in a row during the 4-week payment period, you do not expect to receive more than \$1,000 (before taxes) from employment and self-employment income
- How to Apply for the CERB:
 - The [application for the CERB](#) was launched on April 6, and requires Canadians to attest that they meet the eligibility requirements.
 - Recipients need to re-attest every two weeks to re-confirm their eligibility.
 - In addition to applying through my CRA Account and My Service Canada, Canadians can also call an automated toll-free phone line (1-800-959-2019) to apply for CERB. Please see the [CERB access portal](#) for more details.
- **Enhancement of the GST credit** for low and modest income families - \$400 single adults, \$600 for couples [automatic – began April 9th]
- **Mortgage payment deferrals** for those facing financial difficulties for up to six months for both CHMC insured mortgages and mortgages through the six largest banks [available immediately - please contact your bank plan to access the benefit]
- **Income Tax payments deferred** from April to September 30, 2020. The deadline is June 1st, but there are no penalties for amounts owing until September 1st

- **Mortgage payment deferrals** for those facing financial difficulties for up to six months for both CHMC insured mortgages and mortgages through the six largest banks [available immediately - please contact your bank plan to access the benefit]

Supports for Seniors

- **Old Age Security (OAS) & Guaranteed Income Supplement one time top-ups** of \$300 for seniors eligible for OAS pension, with an additional \$200 for seniors eligible GIS [automatic – payments were delivered the week of July 6]
- **Reducing required minimum withdrawals for Registered Retirement Income Funds (RRIFs) by 25%** for 2020 to provide flexibility for seniors [available immediately]

Supports for Canadians with Disabilities

A special one-time non-taxable and non-reportable payment of up to \$600 to approximately will be sent to 1.7 million eligible individuals who:

- Are holders of a valid Disability Tax Credit certificate (eligible persons not yet in possession of such a certificate would be able to apply for one up to 60 days after Royal Assent to be considered for the one-time payment);
- Currently receive Canada Pension Plan disability benefits or Quebec Pension Plan disability benefits; or
- Are in receipt of disability supports provided by Veterans Affairs Canada.

Supports for Students

- Creating the **Canada Emergency Student Benefit (CESB)**, which provides \$1,250 per month from May through August for eligible students, and \$2,000 for students with dependents or permanent disabilities. The period covered by the Benefit starts on May 1st. You can apply for the CESB starting on May 15. Before you can apply, you must call 1-800-959-8281 to register your Social Insurance Number (SIN) with the CRA.
 - **Potential recipients:** Students of any age which are:
 - A Canadian citizen, including dual citizens;
 - A registered Indian under the *Indian Act*;
 - A permanent resident; or
 - A protected person.
 - **Criteria:** available for those that are:

- Unable to work; or
 - Seeking work but are unable to find it; or
 - Working but unable to make more than \$1,000 (before taxes) over the four-week period for which they are applying.
- **Benefit:** \$1,250 per month or \$2,000 for students with dependents or permanent disabilities for the months of May-August 2020
- **Application:** The application opened on May 15, 2020 through the Canada Revenue Agency. You can [apply for the CESB here](#).
- **Expanding the Canada Service Corps**, which provides youth with community service grants of \$250-1,500 to serve their communities from 1,800 to 15,000 grants [application [available online](#)]
- **Doubling the Canada Students Grants Program**, broadening the eligibility for Student Financial Assistance, and enhancing the Canada Student Loans Program.
- **Increasing support for Indigenous Post-Secondary Education**, and extending expiring federal graduate research scholarships and postdoctoral fellowships as well as federal research grants.
- Placing a **six-month interest-free moratorium on the repayment of Canada Student Loans** for all individuals currently in the process of repaying these loans [automatically available – from March 30-September 30, 2020]
- **New funding for the Youth Employment and Skills Strategy (YESP):**
 - \$15.8 million to create green jobs and training opportunities for Canadian youth in the fields of science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) in the energy, forestry, mining, earth sciences and clean technology sectors. [to apply, visit [this page](#)]
 - \$9.2 million to fund up to 700 new positions for youth in the agriculture sector. Eligible applicants include producers, agri-businesses, industry associations, provincial and territorial governments, Indigenous organizations and research centers. Employers may apply for this funding retroactive to April 1, 2020, with projects to be completed by March 31, 2021. [[visit this page to apply](#)]

Support for Parents

- **Canada Child Benefit top up** - \$300 per child added on top of what is presently received [automatic – May 2020]

Supports for Indigenous Peoples & Communities:

- \$285 million to support the ongoing **public health response to COVID-19 in Indigenous communities**. The investment will fund community-led responses to the pandemic and provide targeted increases in primary health care resources for First Nations communities.
- \$270 million to supplement the **On-Reserve Income Assistance Program** to address increased demand on the program, which will help individuals and families meet their essential living expenses.
- \$44.8 million over five years to **build 12 new shelters**, which will help protect and support Indigenous women and girls experiencing and fleeing violence

BC Government Announcements:

- B.C. Emergency Benefit for Workers - a tax-free, one time \$1,000 payment for B.C. residents whose ability to work has been affected due to COVID-19. [application started May 1]
 - Allow workers to take unpaid leave if they are unable to work for reasons relating to COVID-19 [retroactive to Jan 27, 2020]
 - Allow workers to now have three days of unpaid, job-protected leave each year for people who cannot work due to illness or injury [permanent change]
 - Extend the temporary layoff period to 16 weeks for COVID-19 related reasons
 - Boost to BC Climate Action Tax Credit [automatic - July 2020]
 - Provide a rent supplement of \$500 to be paid directly to landlords
 - Rate reductions from BC Hydro, including:
 - Universal one per cent reduction in rates for all customers
 - A three-month bill credit for residential customers who have lost jobs or had wages reduced as a result of COVID-19
 - The BC Ministry of Children and Family Development is establishing an Emergency Relief Support Fund for children and youth with special needs and their families, providing a direct payment of \$225 per month to eligible families over the next three months (to June 30, 2020) Families are encouraged to reach out to their Children and Youth with Special Needs (CYSN) worker to see if they are eligible.
 - Virtual mental health services to support seniors, adults, youth and frontline health care workers.

Support for Canadian Businesses

Over the last two months, the Government of Canada announced a suite of measures to support businesses and their workers that have been impacted by COVID-19. Please see the [Canada Business App](#) for information on all federal government support for your business.

- Creating the **Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS)**. The CEWS is an up to 75% wage subsidy until December 19, 2020.
 - **Potential recipients:** Individuals, taxable corporations, partnerships, non-profit organizations and registered charities.
 - **Criteria:** The employer will need to show a drop in revenues of at least 15% as a result of COVID-19 in the month of March and 30% drop in revenues for the following months. ***Recently passed changes** to the program allow for further considerations so that all eligible employers facing a revenue loss can qualify with a top-up for the hardest hit businesses.*
 - **Measuring Revenue Loss:** Relative to the same month in 2019, or to an average of their revenue earned in January and February 2020 by either cash or accrual methods. Non-profits have the option of considering government funding or not in their calculations for revenue loss.
 - **Benefit:** The subsidy will compensate up to 75% of an employee's pre-crisis compensation and 75% of salaries and wages paid to new employees for employers of all sizes and across all sectors. The subsidy will apply at a rate of 75 per cent of the first \$58,700 normally earned by employees, a benefit of up to \$847 per week, per employee, and will run between March 15 to July 6. Employers are expected to extend this subsidy to current and rehired employees, while also making their best efforts to provide the remaining 25% of wages to their employee.
 - Employers eligible for the subsidy are also entitled to receive a 100% refund for certain employer-paid contributions to Employment Insurance and the Canada Pension Plan. This refund would apply to the entire amount of employer-paid contributions in respect of remuneration paid to furloughed employees during the period where the employer is eligible for the subsidy.
 - **Application:** Application process is now open and available [through the Canada Revenue Agency](#) with the expectation that businesses will receive the subsidy in about 3 business days.

- Launching the **Pandemic Pay Support**, providing a 4\$/hour wage top up for low-income essential workers. The Province of British Columbia, which is cost-sharing for this program, has identified certain workers in health, social and correctional services that will be eligible to automatically receive this benefit.

- **Canada Emergency Commercial Rent Assistance (CECRA)**
 - **Eligible Recipients:** Qualifying commercial property owners and small businesses, including non-profits and charitable organizations
 - **Criteria:**
 - Tenants paying less than \$50,000 per month in rent and who have temporarily ceased operations or have experienced at least a 70 per cent drop in pre-COVID-19 revenues. This support will also be available to non-profit and charitable organizations.
 - Commercial property owners that agree to lower rent by at least 75% and not to evict their tenant while the agreement is in place.
 - **Benefit:**
 - Forgivable loans to commercial property owners to cover 50 per cent of three monthly gross rent payments that are payable by eligible tenants who are experiencing financial hardship during April, May (both retroactive), and June.

- The small business tenant is responsible to cover the remainder of the rent (up to 25 per cent)
 - **Application:** extended until the end of August
- **Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA)**
 - **Eligible recipients:** businesses and non-profit organizations
 - **Criteria:**
 - \$20,000-\$1,500,000 in payroll in 2019, or
 - If less than \$20,000 in payroll, the organization has:
 - a business operating account at a participating financial institution
 - a Canada Revenue Agency business number, and to have filed a 2018 or 2019 tax return, and
 - eligible non-deferrable expenses between \$40,000 and \$1.5 million. Eligible non-deferrable expenses could include costs such as rent, property taxes, utilities, and insurance
 - **Benefit:** up to \$40,000 interest free government-guaranteed loan which has a 25% loan forgiveness if repaid by the end of 2022.
 - **Application:** available through your financial institution
- **Regional Relief and Recovery Fund: COVID-19** to support to small and medium-sized businesses that are unable to access the government's existing COVID-19 support measures, through Canada's Regional Development Agencies, including \$304.2 million through **Western Economic Diversification.**
 - **1) For SMEs facing financial pressure**
 - **Eligible recipients:** businesses that meet the following criteria
 - **Criteria:**
 - Incorporated to operate in Canada
 - Located in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan or Manitoba
 - Not in a location serviced by a Community Futures Office
 - Not eligible for the Community Futures Emergency Loan Program
 - Fewer than 500 full time employees
 - Not eligible for, or have been declined for the CEBA
 - Operational as of March 1, 2020
 - Less than \$20,000 or more than \$1,500,000 in 2019 payroll expenses
 - Have suffered financially because of the COVID-19 pandemic; and,
 - Intend to continue operations in Western Canada.
 - **Benefit:**
 - Applications can be submitted for:
 - Financial contributions (interest-free repayable contribution) to help support SMEs with operating costs, where business revenues have been negatively affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - Fixed costs that will help mitigate impacts of COVID-19 on SME operations, such as but not limited to lease payments for existing equipment and machinery, property taxes and utilities.
 - Two funding options are available:
 - Option 1: Up to \$40,000 conditionally repayable contribution (interest-free repayable contribution with condition for partial repayment of contribution)

- Option 2: Between \$40,001 to \$500,000 non-conditional repayable contribution (fully repayable interest-free repayable contribution)
 - **Application:** available from Western Economic Diversification RRRF page.
 - **2) For rural businesses and communities served by Community Futures**
 - **Eligible recipients:** businesses that meet the following criteria
 - **Criteria:**
 - Operational as of March 1, 2020
 - Viable and not experiencing liquidity or other financial difficulties prior to March 1, 2020
 - Have suffered financially because of the COVID-19 pandemic
 - Have attempted to access other federal relief supports and were ineligible or rejected; and
 - Have not or will not apply for or accept other Government of Canada equivalent support.
 - **Benefit:** Loan of up to \$40,000
 - **Application:** Available by contacting Community Futures Sunshine Coast, or Community Futures Howe Sound.
- **Large Employer Emergency Financing Facility (LEEFF)**
 - Bridge financing to Canada's largest employers, whose needs during the pandemic are not being met through conventional financing, in order to keep their operations going
 - Qualifying employers will need to sign on to a number of provisions to the protect taxpayers and workers, including respecting collective bargaining agreements and protect workers' pensions, and also require strict limits to dividends, share buy-backs, and executive pay.
 - Recipient companies must publish annual climate-related disclosure reports consistent with the Financial Stability Board's Task Force on Climate-related Financial Disclosures.
 - Further eligibility and application details will be shared in due course.
- **Other Credit:**
 - \$10 billion of support to businesses was made available through the Business Credit Availability Program (BCAP) through the Business Development Bank of Canada (BDC) Business and Export Development Canada (EDC) [available immediately – contact BDC and EDC]
 - Expansion of BCAP to mid-sized companies, including loans of \$60 million per company and guarantees of up to \$80 million
 - EDC will guarantee new operating and cash flow term loans that financial institutions extend to SMEs, providing up to \$6.25 million.
 - BDC, together with financial institutions, will provide additional liquidity to businesses through a new Co-Lending Program providing up to \$6.25 million.
- **A deferral of taxes.** To support Canadian businesses during these unprecedented economic times, we are deferring the Goods and Services Tax remittances and customs duty payments until June 30, 2020 [available immediately – automatic]
- \$250 million to assist innovative, early-stage companies that are unable to access existing COVID-19 business support, through the National Research Council of Canada's Industrial Research Assistance Program
- \$306.8 million in funding for short-term, interest-free loans with non-payable contributions through **Aboriginal Financial Institutions**
- The Prime Minister also announced additional investments totalling \$133 million to support Indigenous businesses, protect jobs, and help communities. \$117 million of this funding is destined to help small and community-owned Indigenous businesses get through these

tough times. The other \$16 million will be there to support Indigenous businesses in the tourism industry, a sector that supports thousands of jobs across the country.

- **Canada Summer Jobs**
 - To support Canada Summer Jobs (CSJ) employers and youth, we adjusted the delivery of the program to better support our communities during the COVID-19 crisis. Changes to the program for this year include:

 - an extension to the end date for employment to February 28, 2021

Travel Advisories, Border Control, & Consular Assistance

Travel advisories and border control directives are issued by the Government of Canada. All returning travellers must present federal and provincial authorities with a credible self-quarantine plan for 14 days. Failure to comply is now an offense under the *Quarantine Act*. Maximum penalties include a fine of up to \$750,000 and/or imprisonment for six months.

Consular services have been working around the clock to repatriate Canadians stuck abroad. Our office will continue to work with affected constituents to assist in repatriation efforts. The [\\$5,000 COVID-19 Emergency Loan](#) is available for Canadians abroad to temporarily cover costs while they work towards their return.

Travel Restrictions for Immediate Family Members of Canadian Citizens and Permanent Residents

The Canada Border Services Agency is announcing that as of June 9, 2020, foreign nationals who are immediate family members of Canadian citizens and permanent residents, and who do not have COVID-19 or exhibit any signs or symptoms of COVID-19, or who do not have reason to believe they have COVID-19, will be exempt from the prohibition on entry to Canada if entering to be with an immediate family member for a period of at least 15 days. Foreign nationals who are admitted into Canada pursuant to this exemption must quarantine for 14 days.

An immediate family member refers to a person's:

- a) spouse or common-law partner;
- b) dependent child, as defined in section 2 of the Immigration and Refugee Protection Regulations, or a dependent child of the person's spouse or common-law partner;
- c) dependent child, as defined in section 2 of the Immigration and Refugee Protection Regulations, of a dependent child referred to in paragraph (b);
- d) parent or step-parent or the parent or step-parent of the person's spouse or common-law partner;
- e) guardian or tutor.

All foreign nationals who have COVID-19 or exhibit any signs or symptoms of COVID-19 continue to remain prohibited from entering Canada.

Stricter rules for foreign nationals transiting through Canada to Alaska

The Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) is announcing that as of July 31, 2020, at 12:01 am PDT stricter rules and additional entry conditions will be imposed on travellers transiting through Canada to Alaska for a non-discretionary purpose. These measures mean foreign nationals:

- Must enter Canada at one of the five identified CBSA ports of entry (POE)
 - Abbotsford-Huntingdon (British Columbia)
 - Coutts (Alberta)
 - Kingsgate (British Columbia)
 - North Portal (Saskatchewan)
 - Osoyoos (British Columbia)
- Will be allowed a reasonable period of stay to carry out the transit
- Will be limited to travel within Canada using the most direct route from the POE to the intended POE of exit, while avoiding all national parks, leisure sites and tourism activities
- Will be required, before entering the U.S., to report to the nearest CBSA POE to confirm their exit from Canada.

In-transit travellers will also be issued a vehicle “hang tag” to be attached to their rear view mirror for the duration of their trip to or from Alaska to support compliance while they are in Canada.

Ferry Regulations

Measures are in effect to reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19 onboard commercial passenger vessels and ferries. Ferries and essential passenger vessel operators are required to reduce by 50% the maximum number of passengers that may be carried on board (conduct half-load voyages) or have sufficient physical distancing measures in place as required by public health orders. Transport Canada is also recommending that travelers wear non-medical masks when they cannot maintain physical distance on their journey.

Policies from BC Ferries

BC Ferries is now screening all customers for COVID-19 symptoms and restricting travel to any customer that does not meet the screening requirements for any route longer than 30 minutes.

As of June 15, all passengers on sailings longer than 30 minutes will be required to wear a face covering and agree to wear this covering in situations where you cannot maintain two metres of physical separation from fellow passengers.

Dear Friends & Neighbours,

Abandoned or wrecked vessels pose an environmental, social and economic hazard in communities across Canada. They can pollute the marine environment, harm local businesses such as tourism and fisheries, damage infrastructure, interfere with navigation, and pose safety risks to Canadians. Perhaps nowhere is this truer than in our community. Residents across our riding know all too well the consequences of derelict boats – and it is why I have made it a key priority to advocate for further action in Ottawa.

Under the Government of Canada's [Oceans Protection Plan](#), we are working diligently to deter this irresponsible practice and to clean up vessels of immediate concern. Through Transport Canada's [Abandoned Boats Program](#) and Fisheries and Oceans Canada's [Small Craft Harbours Abandoned and Wrecked Vessels Removal Program](#), the Government of Canada is helping to remove abandoned boats, educate boat owners about their responsibilities and support research into improving recycling options.

Last week, the Minister of Transport, the Honourable Marc Garneau, **launched the fifth call for proposals for assessment and removal projects to be funded through the Abandoned Boats Program**. Up to \$1.6 million is available this year to help assess, remove or dispose of abandoned and wrecked small boats that pose a hazard in Canadian waters. All projects must be completed by March 31, 2022.

In light of the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic this year, funding recipients will be reimbursed 100% for eligible expenditures for boat removals, rather than the 75% in previous years. Eligible recipients include provinces, territories, municipalities and local governments; Indigenous groups, communities, and organizations; private ports or marinas; Canadian Port Authorities; and for-profit and not-for-profit organizations.




Part 5 General Regulations

5.1 No person shall make or cause, or permit to be made or caused, any noise or sound which:

- 5.1.1 disturbs or is liable to disturb the quiet, peace, rest, enjoyment, comfort, or convenience of individuals or the public; or
- 5.1.2 exceeds the Sound Levels prescribed in this Bylaw.

Bylaw 4500

- (d) Noises or sounds from the loading or unloading of goods, materials, machines, equipment, waste or garbage by any means:
 - (i) on a Sunday or holiday;
 - (ii) before 0730 hours (7:30 a.m.) or after 1800 hours (6:00 p.m.) on any other day that is not a Sunday or holiday.



The solution to this problem is very simple. They need to be fined!

- 10.1 Every person who violates a provision of this bylaw, or who consents, allows or permits an act or thing to be done in violation of a provision of this bylaw, or who neglects or refrains from doing anything required by a provision of this bylaw, is guilty of an offence and is liable, upon summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding \$10,000 and not less than \$2,500.
- 10.2 Each day that a violation continues or exists under this bylaw is a separate offence.
- 10.3 No person may interfere with an Enforcement Officer in issuing a ticket or bylaw notice or otherwise carrying out his or her duties in accordance with this bylaw, and it is an offence for any person to interfere with an Enforcement Officer in the enforcement of this bylaw.
- 10.4 No person shall interfere with or obstruct the entry of the Enforcement Officer onto any land, into any building, or any vehicle to which entry is made or attempted pursuant to the provisions of this bylaw.

The great lawn at the Community Centre site has become a very desirable outdoor program and community space for structured and unstructured activities. Hello Mayor and Council

Although I was against spending almost 100K to install a new fence during Covid financial difficulties, I assumed the District would supervise the installation to ensure the new fence met guidelines. One stated objective was to ensure soccer balls would not penetrate the fence and roll onto Marine Drive. The fence is partially installed and it was obvious the gap between the cables is too large. This afternoon I tested a fully inflated, adult soccer ball (8 1/4 " diameter) and it easily flows between the cables (10in spacing). More concerning, junior soccer balls-the type used by 12 years and younger are even smaller (7.5") with more room to penetrate the fence. In addition, because of the rolling terrain, the gap between the bottom cable is even larger (1.5 feet) at the west end of the fence.

The fence as installed does not meet design objectives and installation should be suspended until a remedy is found. I trust the District will not be on the hook for any additional costs associated with rectifying this mistake.
